

WELCOME TO THE 2021-2022 SCHOOL YEAR

Welcome Back! The year ahead is promising as students, teachers, and staff return to campus. We've clearly learned over the past year that the best option for students is in-person learning and we're glad everyone is back. Student success relies on face-to-face interactions with teachers, coaches, and friends and when we learn together, we succeed together.

As students' experiences over the past year have varied greatly, we're focused on building relationships with students to ensure we meet their academic, social, and emotional needs. Teachers began the year by assessing students' strengths, developing plans to meet their needs, and are striving to build a productive rapport with families. While a virtual open house is not ideal, parents can contact teachers directly if questions or concerns arise and even meet in-person. Finding a resolution to a concern always begins with face-to-face conversation. In November, parents will be able to choose between an in-person or a virtual parent teacher conference, which ever option works best for your family.

As the year progresses and community transmission rates of Covid reduce, we anticipate more in-person opportunities for students and families. At the elementary school, minimizing contact between cohorts of students remains a priority. It greatly reduces the risk of infection and quarantine. At this time, we've delayed making any changes to masking and social distancing as these precautions continue to be mandated by the State of New York. The approval of vaccines for students aged 12 and older has greatly reduced

the number of students placed in quarantine. When students are vaccinated, they are not required to go into quarantine unless they are symptomatic. We hope our younger students have the same opportunity soon.

The capital project is finally beginning to wrap up. The work has shifted from the parking lots, sidewalks, and the high school office to plumbing and ventilation upgrades. A new pool ventilation system is complete and we're currently replacing the hot water tanks, along with quite a number of ventilation units on the roof. Masonry work and the replacement of the front canopies on the west face of the building should be complete in the next month.

OPERATIONS & TRANSPORTATION

Once again, the school year is underway with COVID restrictions in place. However, it is great to have all of our students back in attendance and receiving in-person instruction on a daily basis. It seems good to walk down the halls and see and hear the hustle and bustle of the students passing from class to class, or to hear the teachers and students participating in instruction. Although we continue to follow the guidance that New York State has provided regarding protecting our students and staff amidst the pandemic, our students are able to have/feel some sort of normalcy.

In transportation this year, our bus routes have somewhat returned to normal. However, masks wearing is still mandatory and seats are assigned for contact tracing purposes. As a reminder, NYS guidelines for riding on a school bus during COVID require the roof hatches on the buses to remain open if the outside air temperature is 46 degrees or above, to provide for air circulation. Please have your students dress appropriately so they are comfortable on the bus. Transportation requests have remained the same as stated in our COVID plan to create consistency and safety.

In our cafeteria this year, we are excited to announce that we have partnered with the USDA to provide free meals to all students regardless of income status for the 2021-2022 school year. Therefore, there is no fee charged for breakfast or lunch meals. Any snacks, extra meals or ala carte items still must be purchased with cash or funds on the student's account. No charging is allowed.

In facilities, our custodial crew continues to work hard to keep the buildings clean and sanitized to keep illness to a minimum. As you have likely seen, the capital project is well underway. You may have noticed while pulling into the driveways, the rather large pot holes are no longer there! The contractors did a great job with replacing our sidewalk, roadways and parking lots. On the exterior of the building, you will notice three of the canopies are in the process of being rebuilt and the bricks on the front of the building are being repointed. One section of the high school main entrance canopies has been removed. On the interior, the high school office has been updated and many of the classroom doors have been replaced. There have been other upgrades that are not visible unless you enter areas such as the boiler room or pool room, however these upgrades will improve air and water quality throughout many spaces in the building. Although the project is not completed yet, we are happy with the improvement we have seen.

Thank you all for the community and parent support of our students and school and we look forward to another successful school year!

CHEFS SCHOOL NEWS



Junior/Senior High School Luke Carnicelli, Jr/Sr HS Principal

Greetings from the Jr/Sr High School! I hope you and your families are well. Our school year continues to go well as students and teachers are settling

into their courses. While a different instructional year from last year, we are thankful for all students returning to in-person classes. We welcome our new challenges this year as we continue to manage COVID related issues. We are ready for the challenges ahead as we outline our best strategies to assist students to success this school year.

Below, I included our main educational initiatives this year as we get back to our instruction as normal as possible. These two initiatives are vital to our continued success for our staff and students.

Educational Initiative #1: Multi-tiered systems of support (MTSS)

The data from last year demonstrated a need to provide support to students based on curriculum progress. This initiative will focus on prioritizing standards, collecting data on progress towards standards, adjusting curriculum maps, and providing interventions and supports. Teachers will identify the power standards for their course and adjust their curriculum maps to reflect the power standards on or about September 30, 2021. Teachers will collect individual student data on progress towards the power standards weekly. Teachers will meet in grade level teams to discuss student academic, behavioral, and attendance progress. Students will receive additional support and interventions or enrichment based on the data. Progress for these students would be monitored and adjusted every 2-3 weeks. The MTSS system will be used to analyze overall student progress and reported to student families every 6 weeks to ensure each student is showing growth.

Educational Initiative #2: Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Practices

As we welcome all students back to in person learning, we will implement Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) activities into our curriculum. Social and Emotional Learning is the process through which students develop and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills needed to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. Teachers will receive monthly professional development based on the ideas of Social and Emotional Learning then create evidence-based activities to infuse into their lesson planning. There will also be opportunities to expand staff knowledge this year with the NYSED initiative, Culturally Responsive-Sustaining (CR-S) practices. After our training, teachers will implement Social and Emotional Learning [Character Strong - Sr HS & Second Step – Jr HS] content to support the school mission of being safe, respectful, responsible, and kind, on or before the start of the semester 2, January 24, 2022.

Things are Happening at the SCCS Library!



Agricultural Experiences

Throughout the summer, members of the Southern Cayuga FFA chapter immersed themselves into Supervised Agricultural Experiences (SAE).

A Supervised Agricultural Experience (SAE) program involves practical agricultural activities performed by students outside of scheduled classroom and laboratory time. SAEs provide a method in agricultural education for students to receive real-world career experiences in an area of agriculture that they are most interested in. Therefore, the programs are student-lead and instructor/advisor-supervised. Every year, members create goals and strive to achieve them to further grow their knowledge and skills in their agriculture activity.

During the past three years, Ms. Wasson has worked with members to develop their SAE's. At this time, there are 25 members with developing and active programs. The programs range from paid placements on farm to school-based research. These members will have the opportunity to gain recognition from the New York FFA Association and National FFA Association through proficiency awards and degrees.

Dear Parents, Guardians and School Staff:

New York Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and non-public elementary schools to provide written notifications to all persons in parental relation, faculty and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Southern Cayuga Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications.

The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- ♦ A school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72 hours following an application;
- ♦ Anti-microbial products;
- ♦ Non-volatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in area inaccessible to children;
- ♦ Non-volatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations inaccessible to children;
- ♦ Silica gels and other non-volatile ready-to-use pastes, forms or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- ♦ Boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- ♦ The application of EPA designated bio pesticides;
- ♦ The application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- ♦ The use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.


