

School Board Elections

If you are interested in being a school board member, please call or visit the district office for a petition. It must be signed in ink by at least 25 district voters, and returned to the district clerk in the business office no later than 5:00 on Monday, April 16. Election day is Tuesday, May 15. New school board members must fulfill mandatory training within the first year of service. This includes fiscal oversight training and governance skills training.



School board seats carry three-year terms. There are two seats up for election for the 2018/19 school year.

Qualifications for school board membership in NYS:

- Must be able to read & write
- Must be a qualified voter of the district; a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age
- Must be and have been a resident of the district for at least one year prior to the election but need not be a taxpayer
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family
- May not be a current employee of the school board
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office

Students Helping Students

Southern Cayuga students identified as being at risk of hunger on weekends and school breaks are referred to the BackPack program by school staff or other agencies. This program provides an option for the days when school meals are not available. Nutritious packages include a minimum of four grains, four proteins and four fruits/vegetables - sometimes more, depending on the length of the break. The foods are child-friendly, light to carry, ready to eat, or easy for children to prepare for themselves when they are hungry.

Program coordinator Mary Ferro works with student volunteers to pack weekend food bags. Students are learning about the challenge of hunger; they understand that hunger is an issue in our community and they can do something about it. They offer input about the weekly menu, the nutritional value of the food they are handling and how it will benefit their fellow students. "By raising the food security level

of students experiencing hunger, we help them strive toward academic success," says Ferro. "When students help pack the bags, they are reminded that life situations often change and you never know when you may be the one needing help."

One in six children in America faces hunger, all across the United States. The King Ferry Food Pantry and Southern Cayuga Schools have demonstrated a commitment to reducing hunger among children during and beyond the school day, in and outside of the classroom. "We haven't found a solution to hunger in America, but we have resources available so no one should be hungry in our community, especially our children," says Ferro. "In addition to working with the BackPack Program, I often volunteer at the Food Pantry on Saturdays". The King Ferry Food Pantry is located on the Southern Cayuga High School campus.

Winter Weather Reminder — Emergency Closing of School

Decisions about closing school are made by the Superintendent after receiving reports from the Transportation Supervisor and Town Highway Superintendents. Due to the size of the District (about 165 square miles), conditions in different areas vary. Local radio and television stations will announce cancellations, delays, closings or if a bus advisory is in effect. The SCCS district website, as well as various others, will provide these same announcements. Our phone messaging system also provides alerts about closures.

Websites to Check: SCCS www.southerncayuga.org, Auburn *Citizen* (auburnpub.com) and the Syracuse *Post Standard* (Syracuse.com), and the local television stations.

Please do not phone TV/radio stations or the school, as this only ties up phone lines. If your area has **extremely** bad weather and blocked roads,

please notify the Transportation Department of these conditions. On days when school is in session, please notify the school office if your child is unable to attend due to impassable road conditions. It is of extreme importance that you instruct your children immediately and thoroughly of what they are to do if school is dismissed **BEFORE** the regular hour for any type of emergency.



Technology Classes

The eighth grade tech students were not able to set a new record in the Boomilever competition, but John McLaughlin and Anthony Weaver had the lightest structure that held the most weight, 10.2 Kilograms. Aedan DiSanto and Louis Hasenjager had the highest efficiency rating with 142. This means their structure held 142 times the weight of the structure. Not bad, but not a new record either. Students have completed their sailboat projects where they attempt to build the fastest and best designed model sailboat to complete a course in a 10 foot long piece of 8 inch PVC pipe. Louis Hasenjager and Aedan DiSanto were this year's champions with a boat that took just 4.87 seconds to go the distance.

The energy applications students, the principles of engineering class, and the production systems class toured two local manufacturing plants, Stonewell Bodies in Genoa and Fingerlakes Manufacturing in Moravia. We would like to extend our thanks to Todd Mix and Neal Purdy for allowing our students to visit and inquire about career opportunities at their facilities. Metal fabrication is apparently alive and well in the area with world-wide demand for their quality products. It is our intent to visit some other Cayuga County businesses to observe the production and assembly of other local products that require design and engineering.






