#### The International Club Travels to France


The Southern Cayuga Anne Frank Tree Project (SCAFTP) is proud to announce that SCAFTP Committee Chairperson and Southern Cayuga English Teacher, William Zimpfer, was awarded the **2018 Louis E. Yavner Teacher Award**, recognizing his outstanding contributions to New York State education about the Holocaust and other violations of human rights.

In 2013 the Southern Cayuga community received national attention when the Anne Frank Center USA selected it as one of only 11 sites nationwide to receive a sapling from the horse chestnut tree that Anne Frank viewed from her window while in hiding in Amsterdam. With the support of the District's Superintendent, Mary Kay Worth, Mr. Zimpfer wrote and submitted the proposal that brought the sapling tree to the Southern Cayuga School District. The Southern Cayuga Anne Frank Tree Committee was formed to ensure that the spirit of Anne Frank would live on through programming and community outreach. Mr. Zimpfer has worked tirelessly to promote the SCAFTP mission, both in school and in the community. The SCAFTP committee has sponsored lectures from Holocaust survivors, traveling exhibits, student art projects, field trips, community-wide reads, theater productions, films, and more.

#### **Health and Dental Examination Requirements**

The 2018-2019 School year will bring significant changes for the health offices at the SCCS. These new requirements are for all of New York State and are not optional. It will also bring changes for our doctor's offices. We have reviewed the regulations carefully and plan to make the transition as smooth as possible.

New York State law will now require a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time AND when entering pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, first, third, fifth, seventh, ninth and eleventh grades. The examination must be completed by a New York State licensed physician, physician's assistant or nurse practitioner. A newly required and universal form for NYS has been created and will be initiated on July 1, 2018. Any physicals on alternate forms will be returned with a request for the newly mandated form. Physicals will be done by our school's contracted medical staff if not received on the correct form.

A copy of the health examination must be provided to the school within 30 days from when your child first starts at the school, and when your child starts pre-kindergarten, kindergarten first, third, fifth, seventh, ninth and eleventh grades. If a copy is not given to the school within 30 days, the school will contact you.

If your child has an appointment for an exam during this school year that is after the first 30 days of school, please notify the Health Office with the date.

A dental certificate which states your child has been seen by a dentist or dental hygienist is also asked for at the same time. For your convenience, a physical exam form and dental certificate for your health care providers will be provided upon request.

Communication between private and school health staff is important for safe and effective care at school. Your healthcare provider may not share health information with school health staff without your signed permission. Please talk to your provider about signing their consent form for the school at the time of your child's appointment for the examination. We suggest you make copies of the completed forms for your own records before sending them to the school health office. These are big changes for all of us but we are happy to answer any questions you may have. Feel free to contact us any time.

#### **King Ferry Food Pantry**

Although many children cannot wait for summer vacation, for some, summer vacation means long days without enough to eat. People often think more about hunger around the holidays; therefore, donations to food pantries tend to be lower in the summer months. Contrary to what many people think, the highest demand for food is in the summer. A family must provide more than 100 extra meals during summer vacation for each child who is not in school and does not have access to school meals – a difficult situation for most low-income families to face. Parents who have relied on school breakfast and lunch programs may find themselves struggling to put enough food on the table during the summer months.

Throughout the school year the King Ferry Food Pantry and Southern Cayuga Schools have been ensuring children have access to healthy food on the weekends, so they can grow and learn. The BackPack Program has been sending food home to help fill gaps for students identified as being at risk of hunger. As the school year winds down, the families of students who participated in the BackPack Program will be referred to the King Ferry Food Pantry for the same foods that were available in the BackPack Program, and much more for the entire family!

We encourage anyone who is in need of food to call for a convenient appointment, or stop in to the pantry on the first or third Saturday of each month between 9:00 am - 12 noon. The pantry is located in the Agriculture Wing of Southern Cayuga High School. You'll see raised garden beds outside the Ag Wing which students have planted with vegetables to help feed our hungry neighbors. The summer months provide all of us with the opportunity to plant and grow some of our own food. If you are a gardener and have a surplus of vegetables or fruit over the summer, those donations are most welcome at the food pantry!

Lesson weeks - July 9/July 23/August 6

On May 9 our sixth grade students participated in a day of learning about forensics and accident scene reconstruction. Our friends from the Cayuga County Sheriff's department, Detective Rob Franklin and Officers Mike Axton and Bobby Guarnieri, helped us gain a better understanding of the field of forensic science. During the course of the day our students learned the fundamentals of analyzing a crime scene, how to collect latent fingerprints, proper photography methods and crime scene preservation techniques. We had an indepth discussion about social media and the "fingerprints" that we leave online forever. The Sheriff's Department also made strong connections about how academic subjects ELA, math and science are key components in their careers every day. We greatly appreciate the instruction they provided; perhaps we will have students enter law enforcement in the future inspired by these forensics discussions.

We observed various air and space-related artifacts, ate lunch and toured the gift shop before returning home. The students were exhausted but toured many sights they may not have otherwise had the opportunity to see.



#### **Got Book Volunteers Celebrate the 2017-2018 School Year**

There are many reasons to work, but only two reasons to volunteer – to make a difference and to do something you love. For the 20 volunteers in the Emily Howland GOT BOOK program, both reasons apply. The Emily Howland Elementary School's GOT BOOK program requires that every student read every day. Research confirms that, like any skill, reading improves with daily practice. The GOT BOOK volunteers help students who need an adult to assist with their daily reading goal.

Volunteers meet with students during their lunch time, listen to students read and discuss what they are reading. In the past school year, GOT BOOK volunteers contributed over 26 hours a week and read to 215 children a month. Our volunteers describe their time with the children as the best part of their week. "What could be more fun than reading with a child and talking about what they are learning or imagining," says Nancy Hart.

The program currently has 20 volunteers and can always use more. Fifth graders visited the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Groups hiked two trails, where they spotted geese, baby goslings, snapping turtles, a chickadee and other types of birds. Inside the Visitor Center groups participated in a hands-on exercise using tweezers to represent beaks picking up seeds. We watched a video on how much patience it takes to be an ornithologist and the methods used to spot birds in nature, especially birds that are not well known! We studied murals to see the different habitats where birds live and discussed how their tails, feet and beaks help them in various ways. The weather was beautiful and a relaxing, educational, fun time was enjoyed by all of us!

#### **Canine Officer visits Criminalistics Class**

On the beautifully sunny morning of February 15, Cayuga County Canine Officer Matt Sloan visited the high school CCC Criminalistics class, taught by Ms. Shaw. As students are currently studying poisons and their effect on the body, this interaction connected classroom education to the criminal field as applied in Cayuga County. During Officer Sloan's time with students, he explained the process of training his K-9, Aaron, the different toys his German Shepard works with to prepare him for field work, and the actual use of the dog in ongoing and solved cases. Students were able to hold the arm sleeves used to train Aaron to forcefully grab and attach to the arm of suspects as well as the wood blocks containing synthetic drugs or their scents. Aaron lives and works with his master Officer Sloan, making the relationship between owner and animal very strong, a pivotal component in any successful team. Aaron showed the students his tricks, as Officer Sloan gave commands in both English and the training language. Organized by Officer Nedza, this opportunity to meet the Cayuga County K-9 unit was an eye-opening experience to many of the students.




The fifth grade class at Emily Howland graduated the DARE program on May 25. The program consists of ten lessons that the students do in a workbook; each has a glossary of words the students match to the lesson. They also answer two questions each week; what did they learn and how will they use it during the next week. Lessons cover various topics, including responsibility, personal health, risks, consequences, peer pressure, stress, communication styles, body language, bullying, how to report bullying and making a support network. Students learn how to make good choices using the DARE decision making process: D, define the problems, challenges and opportunities; A, assess their choices using facts and weighing the consequences both positive and negative; R, respond to their choice; and E, evaluate their choices. This is the DARE program.



This past fall, the fifth grade participated in a Monarch Butterfly symbolic migration called Journey North, which is an educational website engaging students in a global study of wildlife migration and seasonal change. We colored life-sized replicas of monarchs and mailed them in. The monarch replicas were sent to children in schools near the place in Mexico where the monarchs spend the winter. In May, we received a collection of monarch replicas back from children all across North America. The teacher letter came from a school in Michigan and it was written in Spanish. The children were excited about all the different places that had participated in this symbolic journey. There is a lot of information, including maps of returning monarchs, on the Journey North website.

#### **Plant Sale**

On June 1 and 2, the seventh grade Ag-Math class in collaboration with other Ag classes and FFA had their annual plant sale. Throughout the final marking period the classes learned about parts of the plant, impacts of bees on plants and the environment, how to transplant plants and take care of a garden. Students showcased their knowledge of the plants by making flyers that were posted outside the garden beds. In addition, codes were linked to additional resources or videos the students made. The proceeds of the sale go back into the agriculture classes.


