#### Got Book? Let's Talk

From the first time your child holds a book, a parent has the perfect time to talk with their child. Talk about what is on the cover of the book. Ask what the child thinks the story might be about. Look at the pictures and ask the child if they know the names of the objects pictured. Look at the faces pictured and ask how the person or animal feels. Pick up a book about tractors and talk about all the parts of the tractor and compare to the tractors you see around your home. Even the most simple baby board book provides so many ways to give your child new words and new understanding of how the world works.

Why would you talk and not just read? For a child to be a successful learner and reader, they need to have a big vocabulary and must know how to process the information around them. Understanding how things work and relate to each other is called comprehension. The bigger a child's vocabulary and deeper her comprehension will predict success in reading and in school.

Frequently the books your child is reading have a very limited vocabulary and the pictures imply a much richer story



than the words the child is reading. Books are given to your child at their reading level, so they will learn to read. Reading can be thought of as de-coding. English is a 26 letter alphabetic code and by learning the names and sounds of letters, your child eventually learns how to look at words on a page and decode them. However, if your

child does not know the word or understand what might be implied in the pictures and words, reading will become a frustrating chore.

If reading is seen as another way to learn about the world, it becomes fun. Who better than mom, dad, grandma, grandpa or an older sibling to make reading fun? When your child comes home with a book to read, take some time to talk and relate the story and information to what the child already knows. Reading and talking are both ways to understand the world, think more clearly and enjoy the ups and downs of both growing up and the history of the world. Take a minute — talk.

Southern Cayuga's Syracuse University Project Advance Public Affairs class recently welcomed local elected officials Keith Batman (Cayuga County Legislator) and Jon Budelmann (Cayuga County District Attorney).

On Wednesday, November 18, Keith Batman joined the SUPA Public Affairs class to share a wealth of information and answer questions helpful to the students in the class on the County Legislators' current projects. Mr. Batman currently serves as Cayuga County's District 7 legislator and was formerly Dean Emeritus of Cayuga Community College. Specifically, students in the class are tasked with defining a societal problem within the community and creating policies aimed towards solving the problem. Legislator Batman provided the class with information on local water quality and broadband internet availability.

On Friday, November 20, Cayuga County District Attorney Jon Budelmann visited the class. As District Attorney, he was able to share his knowledge about the juvenile court system and discuss the heroin epidemic in Cayuga County. He also discussed crime rates and intervention programs to reduce criminal activity in our county.

The class greatly appreciated the time, assistance and expertise of both of our elected officials.

As the year winds down, we are eager to share some exciting news about our Anne Frank tree site! We are one step closer to realizing the community's vision that resulted in the selec-

tion of Southern Cayuga as one of eleven prestigious sites around the country to receive an Anne Frank tree sapling.

During the week of Thanksgiving, eleven granite boulders were placed at the site. The number eleven represents the number of Anne Frank tree saplings given to sites in the United States, including the World Trade Center site, Little Rock Central High School and the U.S. Capitol. Four of the placed boulders are nearly identical in size and shape. These are reflective of Marion Blumenthal Lazan's metaphor of four perfect pebbles represented in the book *Four Perfect Pebbles: A Holocaust Story*. Four is also the



number of members in Anne's family hiding in the secret annex and the number of people who helped them. Appropriately, we must pause to give thanks to Dean Winspear, Bruce Kopp and Beth Robins for donating the boulders, and to Glen Miller for the use of his heavy equipment and assistance.

The Southern Cayuga Anne Frank Tree Project partnered this year with The Harriet Tubman Center for Justice & Peace, Inc. in Auburn to secure grant funding through the Cayuga Community Fund for additional site improvements. Rob Davidson of Exhibits & More recently completed the design of signage to direct visitors from Route 34B to the tree located behind the school. The signs will be printed at a discounted rate and installed next spring, at the school entrance and along the driveway.

Funding is still needed to install reflection benches and a cobblestone walkway that will connect the tree to the nearby school playground, as well as to continue the rich school and community programming supported by the Southern Cayuga Anne Frank Tree Project. We are also actively seeking new committee members, nominations for our annual Make a Difference Awards and ideas for new programming that explores the themes of social justice, equality and tolerance. DO NOT BRING: toys, food/gum, band aids or glass




