## SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION



In its 32 year, the Southern Cayuga Scholarship Foundation (SCSF) Board of Directors is delighted to introduce our 2022 scholarship recipients. Thanks to the continued, strong support of its generous community members, the Foundation was once again able to provide financial awards to Southern Cayuga Central School (SCCS) district students – including class of 2022 graduates, as well as qualifying district alumni – with an historic contribution of 16 individual scholarships totaling \$16,200. Throughout its history, the Foundation has made 341 awards, and has generated more than \$300,000 in financial support.

Southern Cayuga Central School seniors and district graduates pursuing college or other continuing education this year submitted 27 Southern Cayuga Scholarship Foundation award applications. The applicant pool was very strong and with the increasing costs of higher education, as well as student cost of living, the financial need in the community remains great. This year's recipients have notably displayed tremendous work ethic and resilience by prioritizing their educational endeavors despite the trials and tribulations of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Every dollar of Foundation scholarship has been raised by incredible, supportive, members of this community who believe in the value of continuing education for our district's youth," said SCSF president, Carin Kopp. "Despite the challenges that everyone has faced during the COVID-19 pandemic, our community members have showcased their loyalty to and support of the bright, hard-working students of Southern Cayuga Central School – in high school and beyond."

Given the restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic, awareness and fundraising efforts over the past two years have been led by a newly-developed digital campaign that is centered around the Foundation's new website (southerncayugascholarship.org) and Facebook page (@southerncayugascholarships). The Facebook campaign, which has grown its audience incrementally since its inception, has served as a primary awareness and communications alternative to the Phonathon that, for so many years, brought students and community members together in dialogue around the importance and logistics that surround annual support.

Southern Cayuga Scholarship Foundation award applicants are evaluated on their academic record, their demonstration of community service and commitment to work, as well as their thoughtful completion of an essay. The George Peter Service Award\* is made in memory of a founding Scholarship Foundation board member whose legacy was a lifetime of dedicated and selfless service to others, and countless contributions of time, energy, expertise, and enthusiasm to many organizations. A student awarded the George Peter Service Award has demonstrated his or her own commitment to service to their school and to the wider community. This year's George Peter Service Award was granted to Sophia Bennett ('22).

This past year, the Southern Cayuga Scholarship Foundation was the recipient of a one-time donation in memory of a person who was a resident in Southern Cayuga. One year ago, on June 15 of 2021, we lost a beloved Southern Cayuga teacher. Margaret "Peg" Herstine began teaching Spanish at SCCS in 1986. She helped start the Foreign Language Club to encourage students' interest in language, which led to escorting students to Europe and Mexico over Spring Break for many years. Even after retiring due to health issues, Peg went back to teach part time, assisting students





learning English. In memory of Peg Herstine and her love of teaching and languages, Southern Cayuga Scholarship Foundation has selected Beverly Perez ('22), who plans to pursue a degree in early childhood education, to be the recipient of a scholarship\*\* in Peg's memory.

### JR/SR. HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

Southern Cayuga Jr/Sr High School Ranked #1 in Cayuga County by U.S. News and World Report

U.S. News and World Report recently released its 2022 edition of "Best High Schools," which recognizes high-achieving public, magnet and charter schools across the country. A total of 17,843 high schools across the country and 1,325 high schools in NYS were reviewed as a part of the survey. Schools with a national rank within the top 40% nationally are listed as among the country's "Best" high schools.

Southern Cayuga Jr/Sr High School was ranked 362 (top 27%) in NYS and 3,983 (top 22%) across the country. These marks rank Southern Cayuga Jr/Sr High School as #1 in the Cayuga County/Auburn, NY area for the third consecutive year. Data measures used to rank our school includes the following areas... 29% percent of students took at least one AP exam, 94% are proficient in math, 92% are proficient in ELA, and 94% of students graduated on time. Data from this year's edition of "Best High Schools" came from the 2019 & 2020 school year, which was interrupted by the start of the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020.

According the U.S. News & World Report, the criteria for ranking on the annual "Best High Schools" list includes College Readiness (the proportion of a school's 12th graders that took and passed AP exams.)

exams), State Assessment Proficiency (overall performance on state assessments that are required for graduation), State Assessment Performance (how overall student performance compared with what U.S. News predicted for a school with its demographic characteristics in its state), College Curriculum Breadth (12th graders who took and passed multiple AP exams), Underserved Student Performance (assessing learning outcomes among severalstudent subgroups), and Graduation Rate (the proportion of students who graduated on time in 2020).

Students continue to perform at high levels given the challenges to our educational structures due to the Pandemic.

We are very proud of this level of student achievement for the entire school system and for our school community, as it represents a K-12 effort. This accolade notes the exceptional perseverance, focus, and achievement on the part of our students and staff.



For the hundreds of community members who would never miss a Southern Cayuga School District musical production, this year's Mamma Mia delivered our anticipated theatrical hit. The quality of the staging, actors' performance, musical and dance precision surpassed all expectations this past March 18, 19 and 20.

I was anxious to meet the play's director and talk to students who worked onstage and backstage to learn the secrets of their continued success. As with all my conversations, I came away fascinated by the talent of faculty and the creativity and teamwork of our students. I also learned that talents and interests developed during these productions can impact students long after they graduate.

This year's production innovation began with the casting process. I met Director Jennifer Diana, the Junior and Senior High School Music and Choral teacher, when I came to observe a rehearsal two weeks before Mamma Mia's opening. I was intrigued when she told me that she did not announce her choice of musical prior to auditions. "When students are not limited to a specific musical, they choose numbers that give me a much better sense of their singing range and ability. They also cannot select a song to be sung by a specific role—reducing a sense of competition for perceived 'starring' characters. There was no disappointment when, after auditions, I gathered the students and announced the selection of the Mamma Mia cast. Everyone genuinely applauded each casting decision, and we had a team ready to make this the best production of Mamma Mia regardless of their role onstage or off."

### **Engineering Students**

The engineering students in Mr. Gregg's STEAM 7 class took a look into space these past couple weeks, more specifically the modern day Space X program. During this exploration the students visited the planetarium and watched the Mars inside SpaceX documentary featuring Elon Musk's space program and the enduring measures they took to create reusable rockets in hopes to one day land and colonize mars.

Students had the opportunity to create and launch their own personal Este Wizard model rockets on campus, learning the ins and outs of how rockets work.

In conclusion to the rocketry and discovering mars unit, students were challenged with limited supplies and time to create a lunar landing pod that would parachute from 12 feet and land safely and accurately preserving a raw egg within. The classes were not only impressively successful with this mission, but completed it demonstrating teamwork, communication and applying the engineering process.

What a great May and June we had in the Planetarium! We had many visits from our Emily Howland students as well as those from neighboring districts taking advantage of the space. Some were able to interact 'in space' through our Virtual Reality Goggles, while others read books and explored space through an interactive solar system Augmented Reality display. This spring fifth and sixth grade students were able to participate in an Early Morning Robotics program. Throughout the 10-week program, students built robots with Lego Mindstorm EV3 kits and participated in coding challenges with these robots. Some students even took the robots home to share what they have learned with their families. We were also able to explore Virtual Reality with our VR Goggles. During the last session, teams were given limited supplies to construct a boat that would float, move (with the help of a fan) and then make modifications to increase the speed of their boat. We had such a great time, and these 'engineers' showed so much interest and enthusiasm, that we will be offering an early morning STEAM Club, for next year's sixth grade students twice a week. This program will run from October through the end of May! Our SCCS STEAM program has many aspiring students! We cannot wait to see what this group of students will offer to the SCCS community!

### SENIOR TRIP

### **Exploring Philadelphia**

On April 22 Southern Cayuga seniors traveled to Philadelphia to explore the city.

Students visited the National Constitution Center, a hands-on, interactive museum that highlights the evolution of Constitutional rights over time.

The group visited the LOVE sculpture, a work of art by Robert Indiana. The sculpture is in John F. Kennedy Plaza, better known as LOVE Park.

On a walking tour of the city, students visited the 72 stone steps leading to the entrance of the Philadelphia Museum of Art known as the Rocky Steps, all 375 of them, totalling 29,029 feet.

Students spent the evening at Citizens Bank Stadium, having the opportunity to watch the Philadelphia Phillies play the Milwaukee Brewers.

The next day, students toured Independence Hall the birth place of America. The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution were both signed inside the building. Students continued on to visit the Liberty Bell. Tradition tells on July 8, 1776, with the ringing of the Liberty Bell it summoned the the citizens of Philadelphia to hear the first public reading of the Declaration of Independence by Colonel John Nixon. Students then spent the afternoon at Adventure Aquarium, an underwater world with over 15,000 aquatic animals, including the largest collection of sharks in the Northeast.

It was wonderful to see the students experience a new city and take another step toward normalcy after COVID.

The 97th annual New York FFA Convention, held May 12th-14th in Syracuse, recorded approximately 3,000 members and guests. Members of the state's largest agricultural youth leadership organization spent the week attending leadership workshops, participating in events and activities, being recognized for their achievements, and serving in projects that better communities of the New York FFA Association.

In addition to participating in tours, workshops, service projects, and sessions, students were recognized for their accomplishments during one of six general sessions. The following members of the Southern Cayuga FFA chapter were recognized:

Empire Degree - Sophia Bennett and James Rejman, were awarded the Empire FFA Degree in at the 97th annual New York FFA State Convention. The Empire FFA Degree is the highest degree bestowed by the New York FFA. The Empire FFA Degree recognizes FFA members who have received the Chapter degree, been active FFA members for at least two years, completed at least four semesters of agricultural science at or above the ninth-grade level, maintained a supervised agricultural experience (SAE) program, demonstrated their leadership skills, and have shown a commitment to the FFA through involvement at the chapter level and above. Sophie and James, were one of only 145 FFA members across the state to receive this esteemed degree.

Junior Tool ID Contest – Four students from the Southern Cayuga FFA Chapter competed in the Junior Tool ID. Junior Tool ID contest challenges members to identify commonly used tools in the Agriculture, Food, and Natural Resources industry. Over 100 students across the state competed in this contest, and we had two students place in the top 10! Chase Sheils placed 7th and Bryce David placed 10th.

Chapter Delegates Delegate members from across New York gathered to share ideas and perspectives that will propel the FFA organization forward. Two to five delegates came from each of the organization's chapters to participate in the conversation and vote to create changes to benefit members. This year Alexander Keeney and Cennedi McCarthy represented the Southern Cayuga FFA in delegate duties.

### MOCK DWI PRESENTATION

### DUI Crash Re-enacted For SCCS High Schoolers

Southern Cayuga High School hosted a mock DUI drill Thursday, May 26, 2022 in the school parking lot on the north end of the campus.

The event, sponsored by the SCCS forensics class taught by Michelle Shaw, had local first responders and student actors recreate a two-vehicle accident caused by a driver who was driving while intoxicated.

Members of several local fire departments, the Cayuga County Sheriff's Department, Shertleff Funeral Home and Lifenet of New York, the medivac helicopter, participated in the enactment.

Students watched as first responders extracted the mock victims from their vehicles and treated the survivors. First responders narrated to students the sequence of events that ensued after they arrived at the accident scene.

A Cayuga County Assistant District Attorney explained to students the legal repercussions of the driver's choices.

First responders re-enacted the extraction of victims from vehicles using extrication tools, and then "treated" the survivors before loading them into an ambulance. One victim "required" Medevac helicopter transport to a hospital and was loaded onto a helicopter. The helicopter had landed on the athletic field behind the school.

### May Scholastic Book Fair

May 2-6 marked the arrival of the Scholastic Book Fair to Southern Cayuga CSD. While COVID put a pause on the fair in 2020 and 2021, it returned this year in full swing, this being the most successful fair Southern Cayuga has ever hosted. The total sales raised amounted to \$9,575, setting a new record for the school. The profits earned amounted to \$4,787 in Scholastic Dollars, which will be used to buy new books for classroom libraries for all elementary grade levels.

While the main goal of a Scholastic Book Fair is to raise funds, the focus this year was getting books in the hands of kids. Thanks to the generosity of the Hazard Free Library, the Aurora Public Library, the Anne Frank Tree Committee, and our community, we were able to do just that. Over \$3,000 was raised for All for Books, Scholastic's program that helps connect more books with kids and kids with books. Every Southern Cayuga Student in Grades Pre-K through 8 was given \$5 to spend at the fair using the All for Books fund. The All for Books money collected will also help readers beyond our school and community. Scholastic Book Fairs matches monetary donations with a donation of up to \$1 million in books from The Scholastic Possible Fund, which distributes books to children through organizations such as the Kids in Need Foundation.

This year, popular items included journals, pens, graphic novels, picture books, and STEM-focused books. During Community Night on May 4th, families were able to purchase toys, cookbooks, adult bestsellers, and school supplies. Several parents purchased books from teachers' classroom library wishlists or gift cards to support our teachers. Over 70 people attended the fair on Community Night.

The success of a book fair is dependent on its volunteers, and this year we had some amazing ones.

High school students gave up a free period to run cash registers, help students create wish lists, and direct elementary students to the correct shelves. Adult volunteers included Got Book? Readers, who went above and beyond in helping the book fair run smoothly.

#### Fifth Grade

What are human rights, and how do real people and fictional characters respond when those rights are challenged? Fifth graders have been engaging in a joint ELA and Social Studies project, learning about the life of Esperanza Muñoz, through the fictionalized novel Esperanza Rising, written by her granddaughter, Pam Muñoz Ryan. Students built their knowledge about human rights through a close reading of the introduction and selected articles of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), a document written in 1948 by members of the United Nations. We then paired our work by looking at Esperanza's life through the lens of the human rights which were challenged as she grew up with her family in Mexico and rural California during the early 1930s. Students created, illustrated, and shared their own vision of many of the rights outlined in the UDHR. Ask your child to tell you about Esperanza's life. What did they learn? What were they moved by? "When you lie down on the land, can you feel its heart beating?"

### Sixth Grade

On June 3, sixth graders had a visit from the Cayuga County Sheriff's Department. Students listened to presenters Detective Baim, Sergeant Ellinwood and Detective Guarnieri speak about their positions.

Students learned about fingerprinting, crime scene investigation and how detectives can reconstruct an accident using math.

Students also talked about the use of social media and how to use it appropriately.











### **Career Day**

On June 3, Emily Howland Elementary students participated in a career day. It was a great opportunity to explore different careers and envision possibilities for the future. Career day helps students connect what they are learning in school with the workplace.

Students listened to speakers describe there careers, and what type of the education is required for each career.

Update, Safety Plans, &
Grant Funding

Over the next month, the 2020 voter approved capital project will wrap up with the installation of a new secured entrance at the elementary school, along with campus-wide electrical upgrades. The main entrance of the elementary school will be closed for the next month, you may wish to call the elementary office in advance of any trips to the school.

On March 11, 2021, the federal government approved the Federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) which provided short-term funding to local schools to address learning loss for students. Southern Cayuga will continue to use the funds to provide direct services to students through an expanded summer school program, the hiring of intervention coaches, a mental health therapist, ELL teacher, and extra-curricular/ intramural activities for elementary students. The updated Southern Cayuga CSD ARPA Plan has been posted to our webpage for public review. If you have questions about the plan, please contact me.

The updated School Safety Plan is now available on our district webpage. The safety and pandemic plans are open for public review and located under the district tab on the webpage. I'm pleased to report a sharp decline of covid-related illness within our school community over the past two months and anticipate a return to normal operations in the fall. If you have questions about either plan, please contact me.

School Bus Wifi now available to
Students

School Bus Broadband Connectivity is an exciting approach to enhanced learning opportunities for students nationwide. The last bell of the day no longer means an end to instructional activities. Leading technology firms are pioneering alternatives to traditional campus bound instruction. These same firms have conducted numerous studies focused on re-capturing lost instructional time. Transportation to and from school has been identified as idle time with untapped learning potential. An average thirty-minute bus ride can easily yield the equivalent of one day's instruction over a five-day period under ideal circumstances.

The leadership at Southern Cayuga is excited to announce SCCS buses and vehicles are now equipped with broadband connections. In August of 2021, SCCS submitted an application requesting school transportation broadband as part of the FCC Emergency Connectivity Fund (ECF) program. ECF program coordinators awarded Southern Cayuga's request in January of 2022. In April of 2022, vehicles and buses, dedicated to student transport, received the latest in rural school broadband technology.

The district's 1:1 device initiative serves as a solid foundation for digital curriculum delivery. Bus based broadband further expands the capabilities of those districts fortunate enough to have a 1:1 program. The ability to complete curriculum assignments and access digital material is available during transport for SCCS students in grades five through twelve. The FCC itself recognizes the importance of broadband connectivity. The \$7.17 billion government investment in digital content delivery and the belief that all Americans should have equitable access is alive and well in Aurora, NY. Southern Cayuga is committed to adopting technologies that enhance the student experience and prepare our learners with 21st century skills.



Throughout the pandemic, nutritious school meals have contributed to student achievement, supported America's families and provided a critical safety net during economic hardships. With the help of federal child nutrition waivers, school nutrition professionals have ensured safe and consistent access to healthy meals for students. School meal programs now endure acute supply chain, labor, financial and regulatory challenges.

Congress and USDA have opted to not continue child nutrition waivers allowing districts to offer free meals to all students for the 2022-2023 school year.

What does this mean for your family? Parents will need to fill out free and reduced meal price applications for the 2022-2023 school year and must qualify for free meals. This will ensure that your child's benefits continue, will affect any future PEBT payments and will help with tuition and test assistance. The Food Service Department does not receive money from the General Fund and relies on meal reimbursements for our program. As in the past, we will allow meals to be purchased only with cash or funds on account, no charging will be allowed. The district will be setting meal prices for the 2022-2023 school year soon.

### PRE-K AND K REGISTRATION

### Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten registrations for the 2022-2023

It's that time of year! We are accepting registrations for the 2022-2023 school year for both Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten.

Children who will turn four (4) on or before December 1, 2022 are eligible to attend our Pre-Kindergarten program.

For Kindergarten a child must be five (5) years old on or before December 1, 2022 in order to be eligible to attend school. Under the current law, a child who turns six(6) after December 1, 2022 must begin school no later than the first day of school the following September.



# Efforts of SCCS High School Help Neighbors in Need Dorothy M. Ainsworth, a volunteer at the KFFP


Out for a Sunday drive? Make it a point to drive by the gardens outside the Agricultural Sciences wing of the SCCS Jr./Sr. High School (but please, no picking the produce). The gardens are planted each spring, and are maintained by junior and senior high students working under the direction of, Ms. Halee Wasson, the Agricultural Sciences educator and FFA Advisor. The gardens offer the students an opportunity to apply classroom instruction (e.g. plant science) in the development of real life skills – plant and food production. In undertaking this activity, students learn more about where their food comes from, how to grow it for their own use, and the many creative ways in which it can be prepared. Importantly, they experience the positive impact of their labors on the community: Fruit and vegetables are provided to the King Ferry Food Pantry (KFFP) clientele. Indeed, produce picked on a pantry morning will often be on a family's table later that day reflecting the "Farm to Table" concept. Having grown up on a dairy farm in central PA, and having been an avid participant at the local Farmer's Market, Halee remains a strong advocate for locally grown food. She explained that Farmer's Markets give people a basic understanding of how food is grown and help to support local businesses. "Know your farmer, know your food."

When asked about deciding what produce will be grown at the school gardens each year, Halee explained that the garden supervisors (students Sophia Bennett, Charlie Bennett and Preston Reynolds) work with Debbie Patrick (Executive Director of the KFFP) to select specific plants that will be plentiful and remain productive for the season. Spicy peppers, a favorite of some pantry clientele, are usually included. No short cuts here though! All the plants are started from seeds early in the spring and then transplanted to the elevated gardens. Many thanks to the Bennett Family for providing labor. In addition to plants used in the gardens, seedlings and mature plants are grown in the greenhouse and are available for purchase by the public (M-Th 2:30-5:30 until June 24th or until gone). What a great way to support our students, our educators and our community! Interested in helping the pantry? Why not plant an extra row of vegetables and donate them to the KFFP (Ag wing) at 8:30 AM when it is open on the 1st and 3rd Saturdays of each month?
